The Office of High Sheriff

The office of High Sheriff is at least one thousand years old and is the oldest continuous secular office under the Crown. Originally the office held many of the powers now vested in Lords-Lieutenant, High Court Judges, Magistrates, Local Authorities, Coroners and the Inland Revenue. The High Sheriff remains the Sovereign's representative in the county for all matters relating to the Judiciary and the maintenance of law and order. As with so many Royal Officers, the Sheriff began life as a royal official above local interest and therefore able to enforce the King's interest in the county. The land, after all, was the King's land and he was due levies on it. The role given to the King's deputy (the reeve) in the Anglo-Saxon shires was to do justice and help keep the peace through the "posse comitatus" and later the militia.

High Sheriffs are responsible for duties conferred by the Crown through Warrant from the Privy Council including attendance at Royal visits, ensuring the well-being and protection of High Court Judges, acting as Returning Officer for Parliamentary elections in County Constituencies, proclaiming the accession of a new Sovereign and maintaining the loyalty of subjects to the Crown. In practice, some of these responsibilities are delegated to the professional services.

There is a nomination ceremony for all counties on 12th November each year in the Royal Courts of Justice when three names are put forward for the office of High Sheriff in each county. Subsequently the selection of a new High Sheriff is made by the Sovereign at a meeting of the Privy Council in March, when by ancient custom the appointed name is 'pricked' with a bodkin.

The office is unpaid and non-political, which enables the holder to bring together a wide variety of individuals and office holders for the good of the community served by the High Sheriff. High Sheriffs are now encouraged to undertake duties to help voluntary and statutory bodies engaged in the maintenance and extension of law and order.

In the name of the Chapter and Foundation of Derby Cathedral, I welcome you in the peace of Christ.

We gather to give God praise and glory in thanksgiving for our freedom under the law, the Queen's peace, and our national heritage. In prayer and praise, in Scripture and in song, we celebrate God's mighty deeds, his justice and his love.

This year in particular we reflect on the current pandemic affecting so much of all our lives at this time. We hold in our prayers those who have died and all who mourn the loss of a loved one. We honour the dedication of all key workers, and we seek God's will in these difficult times; that we may be instruments of his peace in a broken and needy world.

The Prologue

Anthony J Walker CBE DL, High Sheriff of Derbyshire, reads the Prologue.

The life we lead is in large measure an inheritance from the past. The thoughts we think and the language which clothes them, the houses we live in and the laws which protect us: our towns, our cities, our institutions, our leisure, have been bequeathed to us by our forebears, for us to enjoy and pass on in turn to those who follow us. The greatest of these legacies is freedom.

To every generation the choice is given to neglect or conserve the inheritance of the past: to foster our mental and spiritual resources or to dissipate them: to cultivate the civic values or to waste them: to seek the common good or to forsake it in pursuit of selfish ends. We acknowledge before God that we have not always been worthy of this inheritance. Our freedoms are not fully enjoyed by all.

Our concern at this service is to value afresh the civil liberties we enjoy; to consider how best we may extend them, and to acknowledge our debt to those who ensure their preservation. In particular under the Authority of Her Majesty the Queen, we recognise a freely elected Parliament, where laws are enacted in the nation's interests.

We recognise especially the work of judges and magistrates whose responsibility it is to preside over courts of law, and whose independence from Parliament must be protected. In addition we recognise the role of the Police Service which works with the courts and the community to see that the law is kept.

We recognise also the selfless voluntary service of many of our citizens, in all walks of life, who give up their time and resources for the benefit of others less fortunate than themselves, and we particularly recognise the courage and skill of those whose voluntary service may put them in situations of personal danger in order to protect the public and rescue those in distress especially in these most challenging times.

Finally we remember the witness of the Established Christian Church and other communities of faith in upholding the true worth and dignity of humanity in the order of creation, in teaching that all are equal in the eyes of God, and in showing that true liberty and justice are the gifts of God alone.
